COVID-19 Budget Adjustments

- Budget revenues lower due to COVID-19
- Hiring freeze of FT positions results in savings of \$465,320 for FY 2020
- Temporary freeze of FT positions and one position eliminated results in savings of \$369,893 for FY 2021
- Seasonal and select PT positions unfilled in FY 2020 results in savings of \$199,337
- PT reductions for FY 2021 estimated to save approximately \$41,000
- Adjustments to employee health insurance

Budget Deficit

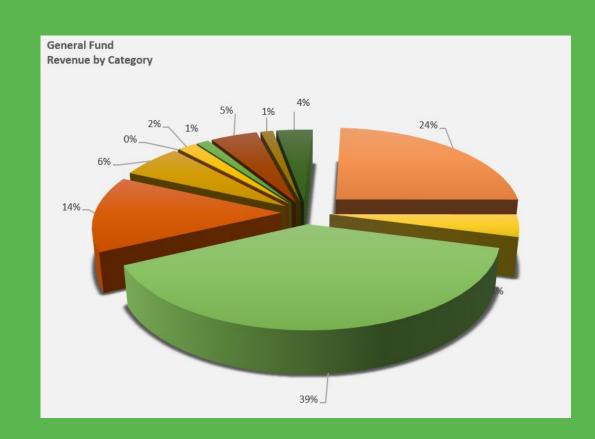
- Projected Deficit of \$630,113 for FY 2021

Local Government Finance

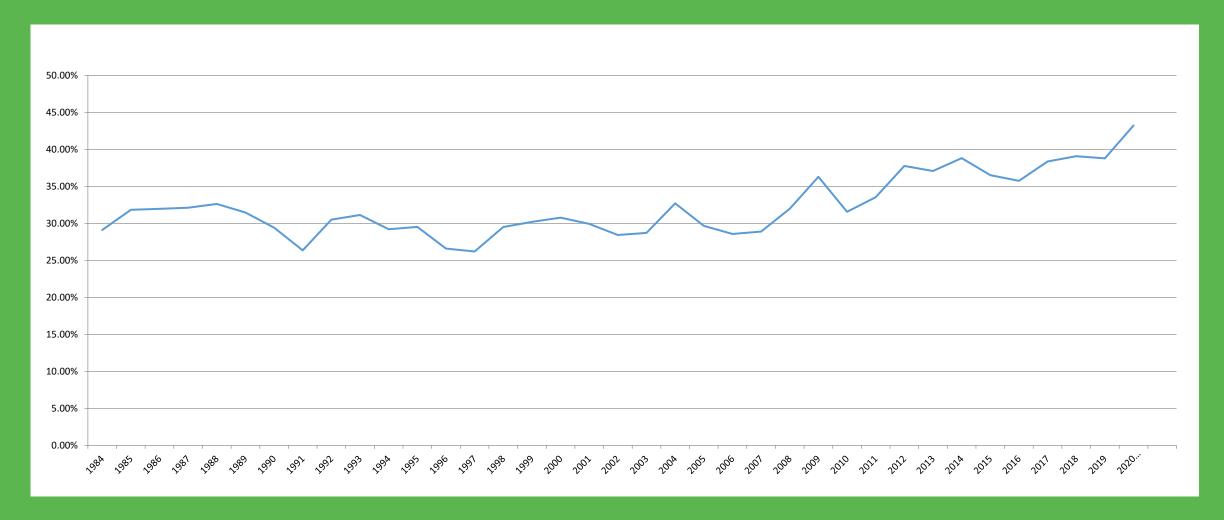
Real estate tax is primary source of income.

Borough's Current Tax Structure

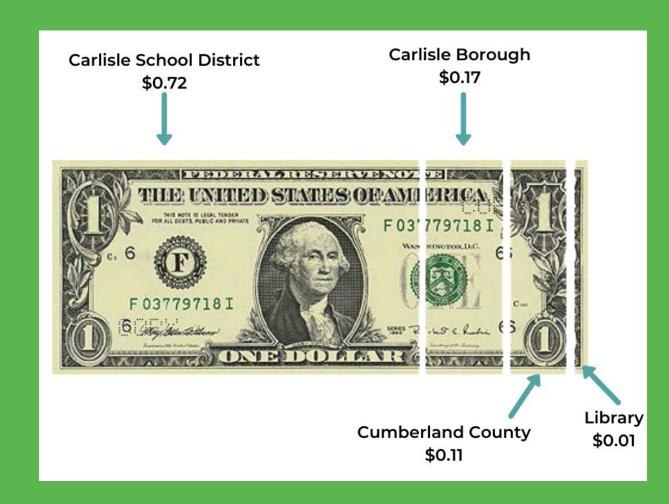
- Millage Rate: 3.495
 - General Purposes: 3.058
 - Fire Services: .437

- Millage rates are the amount per \$1,000 that is used to calculate property taxes.
 - A property valued at \$150,000 would be assessed \$524.25 in Borough property taxes (\$3.495/\$1,000 of assessed value)

Borough's Current Tax Structure

 Millage rate for Carlisle Borough has only been raised six times since 2002. It has remained constant since 2017, even though inflation has risen 5.85%

 Only 17 cents out of every tax dollar goes to the Borough to fund Borough operations and services. The remainder goes to the County and the school district.

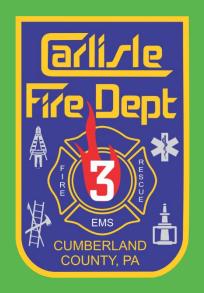

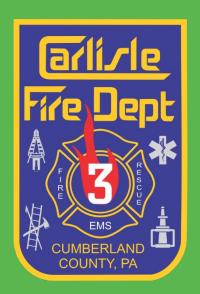

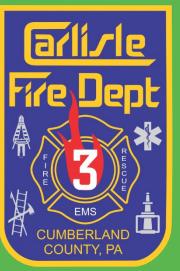

Carlisle Community Pool to Remain Closed for Season While Parks, Spray Pads, Playgrounds, and Recreational Programming Ramp Up

While Cumberland County will reach the "green phase" on Friday, June 12, 2020, the continued restrictions under the Governor's Re-Opening Plan have weighed heavily in the conclusion and announcement that the Carlisle Community Pool will remain closed for the summer season due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Borough Manager Susan Armstrong explained the rationale for the decision. "The safety of our community continues to be at the forefront of Carlisle Borough. Remaining compliant with the restrictions and precautionary measures that are recommended in the green phase for outdoor pools was examined closely by staff. Social distancing, capacity limitations, sanitation requirements, and the time needed to certify lifeguards and train staff were strongly

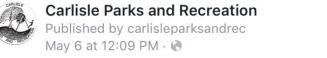

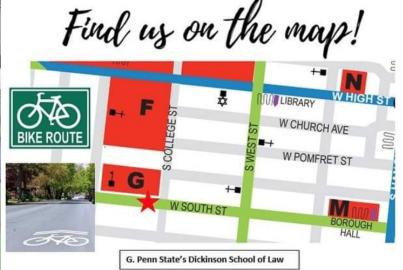

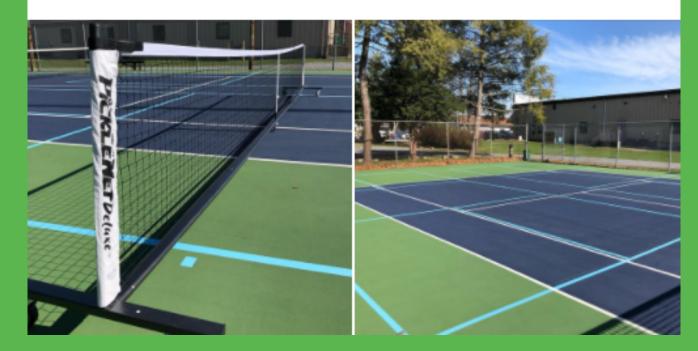
